MICHIGAN MASTERS SWIMMING YEAR-END REVIEW FOR 2006

ANN ARBOR **“THREE”** PEATS AS STATE CHAMPION

This year marked the occasion of the 34th Annual Michigan Masters Swimming State Championships. About 288 swimmers from 25 teams turned up at Eastern Michigan University’s Michael Jones Aquatic complex during the weekend of March 24 – 26, to participate in this traditional event.

The Ann Arbor Masters team won their 3rd Large Team Championship in their 34 year history. AA also won both the Large Team Men and Women categories as well. They are the 2nd team in Michigan Masters history to win consecutive State Championships. The Dutch Masters won the Small Team combined State championship. It was the team’s 3rd combined team championship in their 7-year history. The South Oakland Seals (SOS) won the Women’s Small Team Category for a fifth straight women’s championship. Battle Creek YMCA (BCYM) won the Small Team Men’s Championship. The win marked their tenth non-combined title in the last ten years.

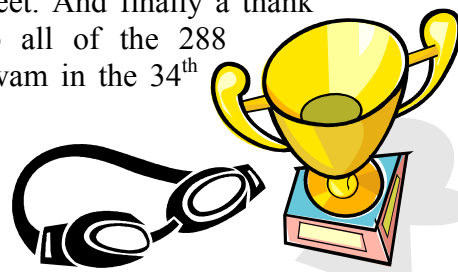
Twenty-eight State Records were set during the course of the meet. J. John Reese set six records out of 7 events swam. Sue Dombkowski set three records out of 7 events swam. Scott Whitbeck, Evan Whitbeck, Kevin Doak, and Jim Makaruskas each set 2 records in their age groups. Alissa Davies, Marilyn Early, Denise Brown, Sally Guthrie, Nick Sosnowski, Alec Mull, Randy Parker, David Spahlinger, Jay Mahler, and Ron Dubois, each got single event records. The FAST 200 Medley Relay in the 25 age group was the only Relay record set during the meet. Results, Records, High Points for both Team and Individuals are included in the results section of the Michigan Masters website.

A well deserved thank you goes out to all the volunteers for the planning and execution of the meet. This



was the 7th time this facility hosted this event and as always Michigan Master appreciates their efforts. Special thanks goes out to George Newman and Ken Shively for their always excellent officiating conducting during the meet. And finally a thank you goes out to all of the 288 swimmers that swam in the 34th annual meet.

2006 MICHIGAN MASTERS AWARD WINNERS

Every year Michigan Masters Swimming gives two special awards presented at the State Championship Meet. Since 1978, The Lawrence Award is given annually to those who have achieved outstanding performances in masters swimming representing Michigan Masters.

The Chetrick Award has been awarded since 1977 and is given annually to those who have given outstanding service and/or best exemplify the spirit and commitment to Michigan Masters Swimming.



This year's Lawrence Award recipient was Corrin Pops. Corrin began swimming competitively in masters in 1988. Since 1988, she has been named a USMS Pool All American 6 times (1989, 1990, 1991, 1992, 1995, 2002). In 1988/89 set 5 USMS National Records in the 50 SCY breast, 100 SCY breast, 200 SCY breast twice, and the 200 SCY IM. In pool competition, she has made the USMS Top Ten 83 times since 1988. Fifty of those swims are Top Three in the age group resulting in 17 Number 1 swims, 13 Number 2 swims, and 20 Number 3 swims. She has won 11 USMS National Championship meet titles since 1990 and was the Michigan Masters Women's High Point winner at these meets three times (1990 SC, 1992 SC, and 2005 SC). She has won 29 YMCA National Championship meet titles since 1988 and was the Women's High Point winner in 1990 and 1991. In 1996, was a member of two relays that each set FINA World Records at the 1996 USMS Long Course Nationals at the University of Michigan and was named a 1996 USMS Relay All American.

Corrin is a teacher and swim coach at Harper Creek High School. She swims for the Battle Creek YMCA Masters team and has been the Meet Director of the Harper Creek masters swim meet for the last 2 years and continues that service. Corrin was the Co-Meet Director of the 1990 State Meet held at Michigan State University. Great swimming Corrin and good luck in the future.

This year's Chetrick Award recipient was Milton French. Milton started swimming masters in 2000 as a member of the FAST swim team. He was the Webmas-

ter of the FAST team before taking on the responsibility of the Michigan Masters LMSC Webmaster in the summer of 2000 and provided these services for three and a half years. He became the LMSC Top Ten Recorder and Data Base Administrator in the spring of 2003 until the present. During that time he took the responsibility of building an Access Data Base of Membership Registration history. He also began policy implementation of pool measurement using Laser measurement technology. He is a member of the USMS National Records and Top Ten Committee and is currently writing procedures on measurement pool guidelines using laser equipment for the USMS National organization. He was part of the Michigan Masters transition team for the implementation of the online newsletter for the website. He was a USMS Convention delegate in 2005 and 2006 and was awarded by USMS as an outstanding new delegate in 2005. Congratulations Milton, and good luck in the future.



EDITH GLUSAC RECEIVES MICHIGAN MASTERS' LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

On March 25, 2006 at the Michigan Masters State Championship Meet, Eighty-seven year old Edith Glusac was presented the prestigious Lifetime Achievement Award. The recipient of this award is an individual who has demonstrated outstanding voluntary contributions and a lifetime dedication and devotion to the objectives of Masters swimming in Michigan. Edith personifies this, not only with her dedication to Masters swimming, but with all of her contributions. Edith has been called an "ageless role model" and "swimming junkie" by her friends for her enthusiasm and dedication to swimming and athletics. Edith has been involved with swimming and athletics for over 70 years and she loves every minute of it. Edith is a life-long Detroit and contributor to girl's high school athletics. She is a former swimming, basketball, field hockey, and tennis coach and has officiated basketball, volleyball, and swimming in the Detroit Catholic and Detroit Public schools for over 50 years. She continues to officiate volleyball and swimming and gives back by working with younger officials and athletes. For those contributions, she was enshrined in the officials/referees wing of the Catholic League Hall of Fame in 1980. In 1990 the Detroit Catholic League named an award in Edith's honor and it's presented annually to an outstanding scholar-athlete in volleyball.

Edith swam breaststroke in high school in 1937 but did not swim competitively in masters in until the fall of 1990 at the age of 72. During her 40 years as a teacher and administrator in the Detroit Public School system, she put most of her energy into teaching and coaching

swimming. She coached swimming for 22 years but during those years there was no adult swimming competition forum. In 1990, after she retired she took a water aerobics class and found it too dull. After completing a 50-meter swim and finding that she felt good, she decided to compete. She swam her first meet in January 1991, hosted by the Fraser Flying Fish Swim Club. She has been involved in Masters

Swimming and Senior Olympics ever since. Shortly after joining the Michigan Senior Olympic movement, she became an Ambassador to help that organization promote athletics to senior citizens. She volunteers her time as a liaison between athletes and MSO. She also is a liaison between the media and MSO. She has represented the MSO in swimming at every National competition since 1990.

Edith has one of the most impressive masters swimming resumés in Michigan Masters history. In USMS Pool competition,

her accomplishments include the following: 8 time USMS All-American, 356 Top Tens in her age group resulting in 51 Number 1 National Swims, and 127 World FINA Top Tens in her age group resulting in 19 Number 1 World Swims. She has won 23 USMS National Meet titles since 1993. She has won 39 YMCA National Meet titles since 1991. She has entered and swam in every State Meet since 1991 and has won 102 State Championship Meet titles. She is the only Michigan Masters swimmer to ever win every High Point award in her age group at the State Meet and she is a ten time winner since 1997, when the award began. She has been All American in 4 out of the 5 stroke individual events with the exception of Free. She has been named a USMS Relay All-

American for 11 years resulting in 14 relays being number 1 in the USMS top ten. In 1994, she swam the backstroke leg of a 400 mixed medley relay that set a USMS National record.

In 1999, Edith received the Lawrence Award from Michigan Masters for outstanding swimming performances and accomplishments. In 2000, she was named to the Michigan Masters "Swimmers of the Century" team team honoring outstanding performances in Michigan Masters history. In 2002, she received the SOS Team Award for her dedication to competitive swimming and voluntary contributions to masters swimming. This past year she received the "Lynne Award" for courage and determination to swim despite illness and injury. Edith suffered a stroke but came back to swimming in less than 6 months and still managed to swim in many meets including the State Meet. As a volunteer, she has made many contributions. She worked at the check-in desk for swimmers at the 1996 Long Course Nationals in Ann Arbor, which Michigan Masters hosted. She has also helped Meet Directors Mel Goldstein and Scott Rabalais at the check-in desk at out of town national meets. She was responsible for all volunteers at the Hospitality room at the 2001 USAS convention in Dearborn. Although this convention was cancelled because of the 9-11 tragedy, Michigan Masters hosted the 2006 USAS convention and she volunteered again this year, helping Michigan Masters run one of the finest conventions ever. She has helped at many State

Meets, with both the check-in and awards tables. In her lifetime, Edith has collected an impressive list of honors throughout her career. Some additional accomplishments include: being honored by the Michigan High School Athletic Association for completing over 40 years as an Official in the sports of Swimming, Basketball, and Volleyball; being inducted into the Polish Sports Hall of Fame; being named Wayne State University's Women of the Year and also receiving Wayne State's Headliner Award given to an alumnae whose achievements have rated headlines in the public press. The Michigan Catholic newspaper has named Edith as an outstanding role model for both adults and young kids. The Detroit Catholic School League has honored her for outstanding contributions in officiating. Edith's secret to longevity is to just "keep on going" and SHE DOES this despite setbacks. Edith is a champion golfer and bowler besides being an outstanding swimmer. She inspires everyone with her enthusiasm for life. I have seen Edith give stroke technique advice to struggling swimmers, volunteer to help at meets, make arrangements for hotel and travel for other swimmers at out of town meets, and give selflessly to others. Edith's enthusiasm is infectious and she has recruited a large and diverse group of swimmers to Masters swimming. Long-time Detroiters, Freddy and Carl Edwards, said that if it were not for Edith's enthusiasm, they would have never experienced masters swimming in their lifetime.

MICHIGAN MASTERS SWIMMERS COMPETE IN THE FINA WORLD MASTERS CHAMPIONSHIP IN PALO ALTO, CALIFORNIA

In August of 2006, twenty Michigan Masters swimmers returned from Palo Alto on the campus of Stanford University to compete in the largest aquatic competition ever in the history of aquatic in the World. The 11th FINA World Championships was the largest gathering of all five aquatic disciplines (Swimming, Water Polo, Diving, Synchronized, and

Open Water) ever. It was an incredible experience because there were competitors from 74 countries from all over the world and almost half of the swimmers were not from the U.S. There were 5500 swimmers from 1161 teams throughout the World. There were 3130 athletes from the USA. Japan's delegation was the second largest with 324 aquatic athletes.



Germany was represented by 237 competitors. There were 100 or more athletes from each of the following nations: Mexico (109), Brazil (118), France (122), Russia (136), Italy (153), Canada (156) and Great Britain (185).

Thirty-two events were contested in 14 different age groups. Participants ranged from 25 to 95 years of age in these championships which are held every 2 years. The 2004 World Meet was in Riccione, Italy and the 2008 competition is scheduled for Perth, Australia. The swimming portion took place over 11 days if the training days and the Open Water events were included. This was by far the fastest and most competitive meet ever held in Masters Swimming. 161 FINA World Records were set; this was the most records ever set in a Masters Swimming meet. FINA, USMS, and the Local Organizing Committee did an outstanding job of running this competition and provided the best competitive conditions for everyone. Two 50 meter pools were used for competition every day and on the day of the 800 Free the competition lasted for more than 13 hours. The Officials and Volunteers should be commended and thanked for the wonderful job they did to make this a spectacular event. I have never been to an event this big that has run so smoothly. The relay day was one of the best days of the meet as a swimmer and spectator. The whole day was dedicated exclusively to the six 200 Meter Relays. 1485 relays competed, the waters were churning almost non stop for 8 hours and the result was 37 new World Records.

One of things I noticed is how much masters has grown worldwide in the last 12 years. In 1994, the World Championships which I had attended had about 3500 athletes so it's almost doubled since then. Also, in other countries masters swimming has become one of the most popular activities for fitness, not just competition. Meeting international swimmers from all over the world was a unique experience and I hope that some of you that missed this will someday get to experience a meet like this. It's quite different than anything you will ever experience here in Michigan Masters. My only regret was that I forgot to bring items to trade with international swimmers. I did get to meet Debbie Meyer Weber and Gary Hall among

DENNIS MCMANUS RECEIVES THE SOS ANNUAL AWARD

Dennis McManus received the annual SOS team award on July 23rd 2006 at the SOS annual long course meet. The recipient of this award is a swimmer whose service, commitment, athletic performance, and dedication best exemplify the spirit, desire, and commitment for the advancement of Masters' Swimming.

Dennis started swimming competitively in Masters' Swimming in the Fall of 1987, 22 years after swimming in high school at Royal Oak, Dondero. In 1998, he became the newsletter editor for Michigan Masters and served in that capacity for six years. In 2001, at the USAS Convention, the Michigan Masters' "Wave Eater" was recognized among the top ten newsletters in all of USMS. At the same convention, Dennis was the State Masters' liaison to the National Aquatic Organization, responsible for local hospitality and service to USMS.

From 2003 to the summer of 2005 he served as the Michigan Masters Webmaster and helped in the transitioning process of formatting the newsletter online. Prior to this he was the webmaster for the SOS team from 1996 until 2001, and that website

was recognized as one of the top ten Masters' Aquatic Coaches Association's team websites for the year 2000. He is also currently completing his two-year term as Michigan Masters President.

Dennis has assisted in the administration for Michigan Masters State Championships meets in 1997, 1998, 1999, and 2002. One of Dennis' hobbies is photography and he used that skill very effectively to record pictures of swim meets and other aquatic events. These pictures have been used in USMS publications, the Wave Eater, and on the Michigan Masters' and SOS websites. Additionally he has used his graphic talents to design the state meet logos for the championship meets in 1998, 1999, 2002, and 2003.

In 2003, he received the Chetrick Award, which exemplifies outstanding service to Michigan Masters. In 2004, he received the USMS National Service Award for outstanding contributions to masters swimming. Additionally, in 2000 he received the Lynne Award for showing courage and tenacity for continuing to swim despite illness and injury.
